

A very few of UHL's tan mugs were made with a marking on the bottom that some could not figure out, some thought it to be a naked woman and others correctly recognized part of it as an airplane. (If you think it's a naked woman, turn it 90 degrees to the left; those legs are the tail and a wing). This mug is a commerative of Charles Lindbergh's historic flight in 1927. The plane and the "WE" are the cover of a book of said title also published in 1927 of this flight.

The plane, "The Spirit of St. Louis" and Charles Lindbergh are the "we". This flight was the first solo across the Atlantic Ocean. They flew non-stop from New York to Paris in 33\frac{1}{2} hours on May 20-21, 1927.

This book is available at used book stores and flea markets. The lovely edition displays the cover decor in gold on blue. A cheaper edition replaces the gold with a yellow paint. We've seen them for \$15. or less and paid \$8. for ours (gold).
