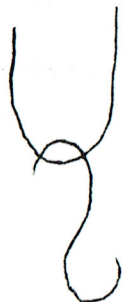


Upton Stucky Pottery

A request came in for this information that Phyllis O'Neal sent to me in July. Here it is:

Upton or Martin Stucky pottery was made in Martin County, Indiana in the 1800's.

The O'Neals have a churn that is marked, 'Manufactured by Upton Stucky'. They also have a jar attributed to Upton Stucky because it bears a mark very similar to the one on their churn. They believe the mark uses the "U" and "S" from his name.
